Who We Are

The College Prep Programs serve students of all ages from all communities within New Mexico. CPP strives to give students a foundation of college and career readiness skills, leadership and teamwork skills and the college life experience. Through campus visits, residential programs, and community outreach the College Prep Programs is able to reach New Mexico students and give them information, skills and experiences that make college a reality.

Mission

The mission of College Prep Programs (CPP) is to promote P-20 student success and post-secondary education, from college awareness to college readiness, through academics, career exploration, civic engagement, college-life and leadership development for students from low-income and first generation college-attending families in New Mexico and across the country. The College Readiness Program provides yearlong support and college and career readiness classes, philanthropy projects, cultural events and dual-credit. The Summer College Prep Programs provides various residential camps focusing on allowing students to experience college life through academic courses, career exploration, leadership training, college life workshops, and cultural excursions.

Vision

The vision of the College Prep Programs is to make college a reality and give students the foundational skills and knowledge to successfully navigate the post-secondary institution.

Impact on Students

The College Prep Programs has been able to reach 500+ students each year through various avenues. Outreach efforts bring hundreds of students to visit the UNM campus. Students are able to work directly with college students and support program staff to learn more about the opportunities available to them and the experience of students on campus. The CPP Residential programs allow students to experience the college campus life first hand, make connections with student support staff, and gather more information on programs available at the university, and network with career professionals. CPP students enrolled in the College Readiness Program are able to gain college credit and support as they learn more about college and career readiness. These students develop their leadership skills, research career opportunities and participate in philanthropy projects as they prepare for graduation.



Programs, Services, Sub-units and Initiatives

College Prep Programs Outreach — CPP provides campus tours, student anels and college readiness presentations to multiple student groups and chools within New Mexico. Each campus visit is tailored to fit the group isiting. CPP engages with students from elementary school to high school. 

Goals for 2019-2020



- 5. Provide access to information that will ensure student success in their post-secondary education endeavors.








Overall impact of College Readiness, Summer Law Camp and Hispanic Youth Research and Leadership Program on Post-secondary enrollment.
