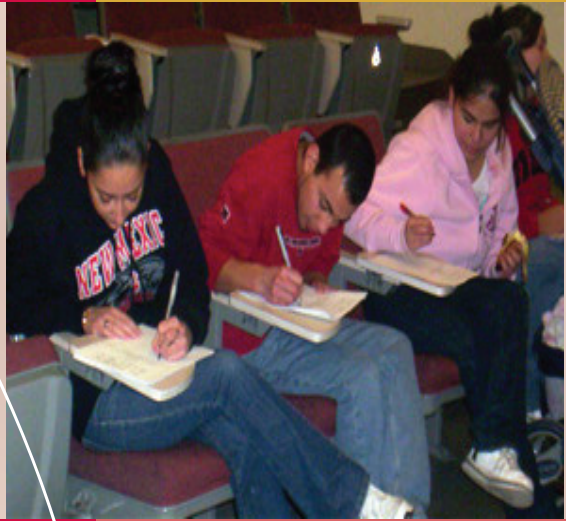

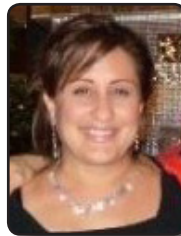

In order to become eligible for services, the student should first seek academic adjustment because of a disability and register with the office and submit documentation of the disability from a licensed or certified professional. Once a student establishes that he/she has a disability, UNM will work with the student to determine what academic adjustments are appropriate.

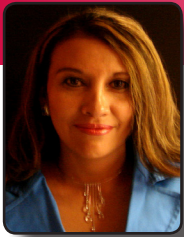
