Who We Are

The College Enrichment & Outreach Programs (CEOP) is a department designed to promote P-20 student success through college awareness and readiness, academic support, career exploration, civic engagement, college life and leadership development. CEOP serves as the *'umbrella'* that oversees seven (7) unique programs and services, designed to work together in an effort to minimize the educational achievement gap.

Though each program is individually funded and have specific target outcomes, they all share the same vision of creating access to higher education for underrepresented student populations which include:

- Low – Income
- First – Generation to college
- Students with a documented disability
- and/or students from rural areas

Programs within CEOP fall under one of two areas; Outreach or Enrichment.

Outreach

Our **Outreach Initiatives** serve individuals within our community. This can range anywhere from talking to kindergarten students about college, helping individuals earn their GED, and/or assisting adult learners enroll in postsecondary education.

Enrichment

Our **Enrichment Initiatives** serve individuals who are prospective, current, or previous UNM students. This can range from helping students complete financial aid, decide on a major, apply to graduate school, or any assistance required to succeed at UNM.

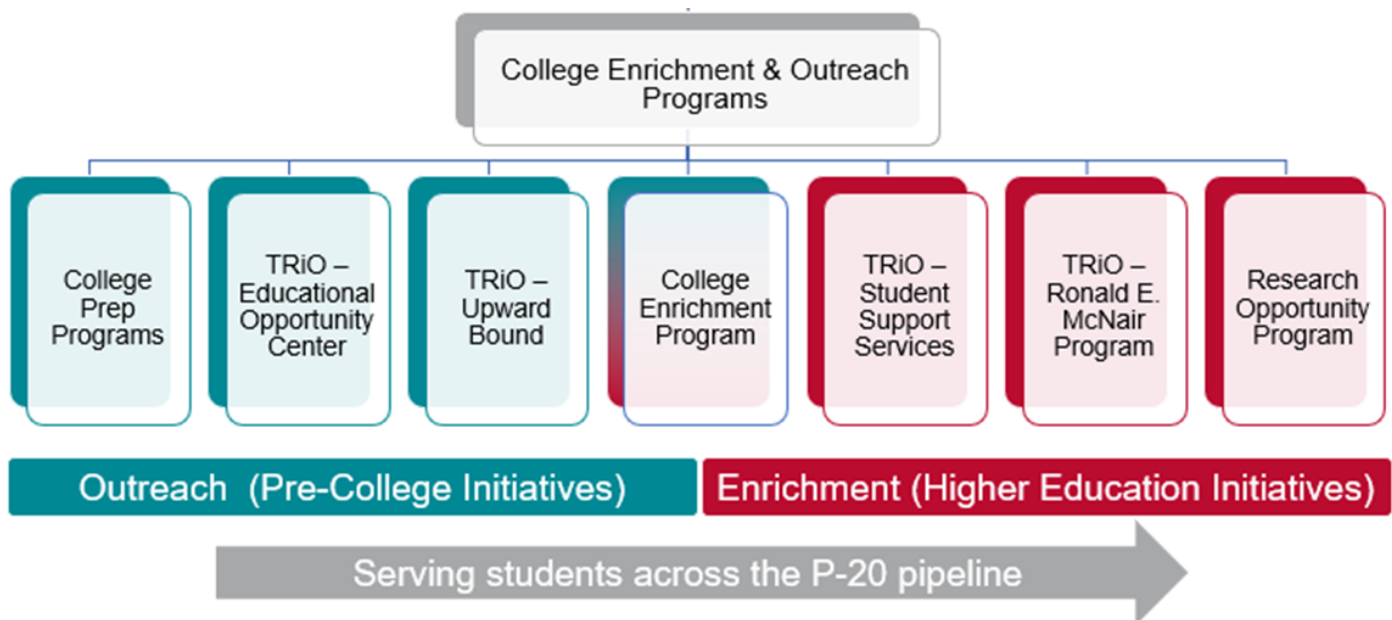

- **Strategic Goal 4:** In efforts with the Council for Opportunity in Education, create awareness of support and resources for First Generation students at UNM

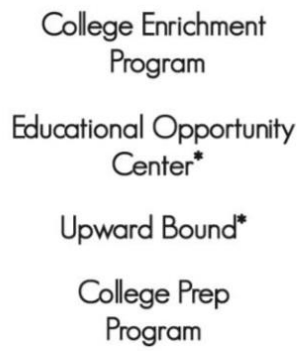
Selected Impacts and Outcomes

800+ students served in College Prep Programs

28 students in McNair/ ROP (grant and state funded)

1,709 students served with College Enrichment Program (CEP)

135 students in Upward Bound (grant funded)

Quick Facts

- CEOP brings in over \$4 million annually in federal funding from the US Department of Education to serve UNM students.
- CEP created the first New Student Orientation at UNM. In 1969, orientation was 2.5 months long! Now, it's 2.5 days!
- In 2017, SSS had a persistent rate of 97% for its cohort participants. The SSS 6-year graduation rate was over 72%
- The McNair / ROP program hosts an undergraduate research conference each October. Over 200 students attend!
