Dear Student Affairs Family,

I'm ecstatic to have the opportunity to address the Division within the Weekly CONNECT – thank you Dr. Scott!

We're a week and some change into November and we've already experienced the end of daylight saving time, an election, a snow day, and much more! Though Veterans Day is officially observed on November 11, one day is never enough to honor our veterans for their service and sacrifice. The <u>Veteran & Military Resource Center</u> has a number of <u>activities</u> planned for this week and I hope you each find time to participate in the celebration in your own way.

November also marks national American Indian Heritage Month! Within New Mexico we are blessed to be surrounded by vibrant Indigenous communities yet many within this country view Indigenous folx as relics of the past. Within higher education, our students are rendered invisible across data and research as highlighted within the book authored by student affairs professionals in *Beyond the Asterisk: Understanding Native Students in Higher Education*. According to the 2020 Census, over 9.9 million and 1.5 million individuals identified as American Indian/Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian (alone or in

combination) respectively. Within the Land of Enchantment, Indigenous peoples account for 12.7% of the state population while American Indian and Native Hawaiian (alone) students make up 9.2% of The University of New Mexico. Data is not always viewed as exciting, but it's very important as we tell our stories and advance the work done at our institution and within American Indian Student Services (AISS).

In recognition of our own Indigenous student population, I hope to impress upon our community that Indigenous peoples exist on our campus and they're thriving! AISS, Native American Studies, Center for Native American Health, other UNM departments, chartered student organizations, and community organizations are hosting a variety of engaging programs throughout this month to celebrate and honor the past, present, and future contributions of the original inhabitants of what is now the United States.

Thank you for allowing me into your day via this message. I'm proud to be a Lobo and feel fortunate to be a student affairs professional working alongside incredibly hardworking, creative, and caring individuals who make direct contributions to student success every day. Go Lobos!

The University of New Mexico supports its student parents via various services including childcare at the UNM Children's Campus; and lactation stations, family-friendly computer pods, student-led workshops, SNAP application assistance and free counseling and confidential advisory through the Women's Resource Center.

UNM Mandatory Training



Just a reminder that annual training for all UNM employees is due by Monday. Dec. 2. There are now four required courses, including the new "Securing the Human" security training.

- MT 2024E or MT 2024S: Prevention of Harassment and Discrimination
- BAST 2024: Basic Annual Safety Training 2024
- ACSH 2024: Active Shooter on Campus: Run, Hide, Fight 2024
- SANS Security Awareness Training 2024: Securing the Human

These courses take about two hours and have already been added to your Learning Central training plan. Annual mandatory training is crucial in keeping us informed about important safety issues, from preventing accidents and harassment to knowing what to do in an active shooter scenario.

All UNM employees - including regular and temporary staff, faculty, on-call workers, and student employees - must complete these trainings. Get started on UNM Learning Central.
