Daily Lobo Wins Four New Mexico Press Association Awards

The Daily Lobo was recently recognized with four awards from the New Mexico Press Association Better Newspaper contest. Awards included first and second place for investigative reporting, and two additional second place awards in the news writing and editorial categories.

First-Gen Focus Committee



The First Gen Focus Committee is seeking staff members for the 2024-2025 year to continue advancing the division's goals and priorities for UNM's first-generation student population. The committee will identify, track, and encourage the implementation of empirically researched best practices that have been shown to benefit first-generation college students and advance their likelihood of postsecondary student success outcomes. Further, the committee will be responsible for implementing visible and engaging celebrations of the contributions that first-generation students make to the UNM community.

The committee will be chaired by a Division of Student Affairs (DSA) First-Gen Champion. This individual will be selected from a slate of interested individuals by the Student Affairs Executive Leadership team. The First-Gen Champion/Chair will lead the committee in advancing its charge, serve as a visible proponent of first-generation practices, and participate in professional development focused on first-generation supportive practices. Specific responsibilities include serving as lead for best practice research, survey design, and programming and as the institutional representative at monthly NASPA regional meetings.

- MT 2024E or MT 2024S: Prevention of Harassment and Discrimination
- BAST 2024: Basic Annual Safety Training 2024
- ACSH 2024: Active Shooter on Campus: Run, Hide, Fight 2024
- SANS Security Awareness Training 2024: Securing the Human

These courses take about two hours and have already been added to your Learning Central training plan. Annual mandatory training is crucial in keeping us informed about important safety issues, from preventing accidents and harassment to knowing what to do in an active shooter scenario.

All UNM employees - including regular and temporary staff, faculty, on-call workers, and student employees - must complete these trainings. Get started on UNM Learning Central.
