UNM Big Give Set a Record in 24 Hours



Thank you! UNM Big Give was a huge success thanks to the unprecedented participation and generosity of alumni and supporters worldwide. In Student Affairs, we raised a total of \$32,328 from 391 donors supporting 18 funds. Of this, the Lobo Food Pantry raised \$24,914 from 261 donors, in part due to the support of fraternities and sororities during Greek Week.

Seidler Natatorium Feasibility Study and Facility Assessment



UNM is currently conducting a Feasibility Study and Facility Assessment of the Seidler Natatorium which includes the Olympic Pool and Therapy Pool. Through a series of workshops this spring, the study is intended to identify ongoing issues and deficiencies with the Natatorium, as well as look to the future and plan for how the facility can best serve all of its users. The study will investigate how additional spaces and modifications to the existing Natatorium can improve the facility.

The study will also coordinate any site development with the Integrated Campus Plan (ICP) currently underway. The goal of the study is to identify and prioritize the needs and then develop a cost model to pursue future funding. Repairs, upgrades and programmatic additions will likely occur in several phases. The Feasibility Study is scheduled to be completed by May of 2024.

The first session will be held today from 11 am to noon in Johnson Center 1102, Recreational Services Office, located just inside the west entrance to Johnson Center. There will be a short presentation followed by guided discussion to answer questions and gather your input. For more information contact the Recreational Services Office at 505-277-0178.


