Southwest Airlines helped El Puente Research Fellows take Experiential Learning to New Heights

For the first time in El Puente's nine-year graduate school experiential trip history, students were able to trade their 8-hour drive for a one-hour plane ride thanks to the generosity of Southwest

Airlines. The airline donated 34 e-tickets valued at over \$13K to the program allowing them to save time while taking their graduate school journey to new heights.

The donation was used to obtain Southwest Airline tickets for 24 undergraduate fellows, four graduate fellows, and staff coordinators—meaning this year they spent less time getting to Phoenix and more time learning in Phoenix. For some students, both the journey and the destination were transformative.

"It was nice to fly because it removed the stress of having to worry about driving out to Phoenix during inclement weather," said Alejandro Mendiaz-Rivera, program director for El Puente Research Fellowship. "Some of our fellows had never flown before and Southwest gave them the opportunity to experience that."
