Dear Hiring Committee,

I write to express my interest in the position of Director of the Women's Resource Center at the University of New Mexico. As a feminist higher education professional, my program administration and student development experience promote gender and racial equity with a particular focus on sexual and reproductive health. I currently serve as Administrative Associate Professor of Women's Leadership and Assistant Director of Community Engagement at the Newcomb Institute of Tulane University, whose mission is to develop feminist leaders for a gender-equitable future. As an alumna of the University of New Mexico, I would be eager to bring my expertise in student development, program administration, and feminist theory and praxis to the directorship of the Women's Resource Center.

My experience working in gender and higher education is extensive and varied. Over the last six years at Newcomb Institute, I have been integrally involved in the planning and administration of programs that address the needs of women and other gender minorities at Tulane University. Building on my time in Tulane's Academic Advising Center, in which I supervised a team of advisors and managed a caseload of over 200 students, my work at Newcomb Institute combines my background in student development and retention with my deep academic training in gender and sexuality studies. As such, I bring an informed perspective on the crucial relationship between student success in the classroom and the gendered experiences of women students on campus. At Newcomb Institute, I regularly participate in and often lead efforts to produce campus resources around sexual and reproductive health, pregnancy and parenting support, gender-based violence, menstrual equity, and other gendered issues. For instance, I am a member of the university's Post-*Dobbs* Working Group, which identifies student concerns related to Louisiana's near-total abortion ban and develops appropriate resources in response. As a member of this group, I collaborate with representatives from the Title IX office, Case Management and Victim Support Services, Campus Health, and other university partners to ensure the rights and well-being of students who can become pregnant.

In my role as Assistant Director of Community Engagement at Newcomb Institute, I have gained significant skills in the areas of program administration, event planning, financial management, fundraising, and strategic planning. For instance, I direct Newcomb Institute's Reproductive Rights and Reproductive Health (RRRH) Internship Program and its Feminist Summer Internship Program, both of which place undergraduate students in paid internships at local and national organizations with whom I have cultivated relationships (e.g. SisterLove, Ms. magazine, the National Women's Law Center, and many others). The program assessment I conducted on the RRRH program, published in the Journal of Higher Education Outreach and Engagement, illustrates the program's immense success. I also coordinate grants for experiential learning opportunities, such as Feminist Camp and the Let's Talk About Sex conference, and I organize several major events each year, including Conceiving Equity, which features 15 to 20 student poster presentations and an annual lecture by a premier scholar of reproductive health. I have coordinated visits by several world-renowned reproductive justice scholars, such as Dorothy Roberts and Loretta Ross, overseeing event logistics and outreach to ensure participation from campus and local partners and to cultivate a wide audience. I manage an annual budget of over \$130,000 for these programs, while stewarding donors and writing major gift proposals to grow capacity. I have participated in strategic planning to set priorities for Newcomb Institute, which has a \$2.5 million annual budget, including navigating alumni and donor boards, crafting vision and mission statements, and developing communication materials.

In my role as a founding member and co-convener of the New Orleans Maternal and Child Health Coalition, which aims to improve racial disparities in birth outcomes by centering the experiences of Black birthing people and their families, I have gained experience in public relations and communications, personnel management, political advocacy, and grant writing. Over the last 5 years, since the coalition's founding, I have served as the primary administrator of this group of over 100 community and academic stakeholders. In our second year, I

secured funding for a graduate assistant, whom I have managed for the last four years as a co-convener of the coalition. Together, we conducted all internal and external communications and manage relations with the coalition's community advisory board. As the coalition gained prominence, I have represented it in governing boards and working groups at the city and state levels. In 2020, I received the Coalition Builder Award from the National Women's Studies Association's Women's Center Committee for this work. In 2022, I collaborated with the Institute of Women and Ethnic Studies to write a successful grant for \$200,000 from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation to fund a full-time staff person to serve as coordinator of the coalition over the next two years.

I am also a gender and sexuality studies teacher and scholar with expertise in feminist epistemologies and pedagogies, reproductive justice, intersectionality, and sexual health. My book, *Mediating Morality: The Politics of Teen Pregnancy in the Post-Welfare Era*, charts a shift in political and popular discourse on adolescent pregnancy and contains a chapter on the history of adolescent pregnancy in New Mexico. My work has also been published in *Signs: Journal of Women in Society, Frontiers: A Journal of Women's Studies, Women's Health Issues, Feminist Media Studies*, and elsewhere. I have taught a wide breadth of courses on feminist issues, including *Feminist Epistemologies and Research Design, Introduction to Gender and Sexuality Studies*, and *Sexuality, Knowledge Production, and Education.* In my administrative duties, I draw upon my scholarly expertise to implement the latest insights and best practices in supporting women students in higher education.

I am excited about the possibility of bringing this experience to the directorship of the Women's Resource Center at my alma mater. In my eight years at the University of New Mexico in various roles – graduate student and instructor of record in American Studies, tutor in the Lobo Center for Student-Athlete Success and the Center for Academic Program Support, graduate fellow in the Center for Southwest Research – I found immense satisfaction in working at a public institution and serving its diverse array of students. I would relish the opportunity to be a leader in UNM's gender equity work.

Thank you for your time in considering my application. I look forward to the possibility of discussing my qualifications with you further.
